PRANZINI'S ACCOMPLICE.

Paris Dispatch to the London Chronicle.

A man giving the name of Geissler has been apprehended in Cahors on suspicion of being Pranzini's accomplice. The real companion, and perhaps the accomplice of the murderer of the Rue Montaigne lives in Paris, and is well known. As he is of a highly respectable family, and there exists no proof against him, great influences have been brought to bear upon the authorities, and his name has not been made public. Pranzini was once asked whether he knew him. After a moment's hesitation he seemed to swallow the words he might have been about to utter, and said "No" with artificial emphasis. A priest told me yesterday that the Paris clergy are being perpetually pestered by individuals, who say that they were accessory to Pranzini's crime. They know that professional secrecy binds a priest, and they invariably ask for a sum of money to leave the country.
