PRANZINI AS A CONDUCTOR.

The man Pranzini, who stands accused of the ghastly triple murder in Paris, was not, as stated by some of the papers, formerly employed on the Mann car from Boulogne to Brindisi. He was conductor of the Pullman car running between Bologna and Brindisi during the Egyptian war of 1882. In appearance a very striking-looking person, and, when sporting his fur-lined coat, he might easily have been mistaken for a passenger. Pranzini, there is no doubt, carried on a series of depredations from the unconscious occupants of the car during the whole time that he was employed as conductor; and, indeed, it was only by his accidentally leaving in the lavatory of the car the empty case which had contained some diamonds he had stolen one night on the homeward journey to Bologna that he was eventually discovered and dismissed.
